



Policy for Physician Assistants Regaining Certification

PAs who have lost certification may regain it by fulfilling CME requirements and passing PANRE.

Eligibility. To be eligible to apply for PANRE to regain certification, PAs must first log at least 100 Category 1 CME credits earned within the two-year period ending on the date the PA's PANRE application is submitted to NCCPA.

PAs who have lost eligibility for certification due to NCCPA disciplinary proceedings must first apply to reestablish eligibility.

PAs seeking to regain certification will be eligible to apply for PANRE as soon as they are qualified to do so as described above. After that first attempt, PAs seeking to regain certification may take PANRE only one time in any single 90-day period.

Applicants must agree to abide by the NCCPA's published policies and procedures and its *Code of Conduct*; must truthfully respond to questions about their professional, licensure and criminal background posed by NCCPA; and must agree to arbitrate any claims against the NCCPA in the event of a dispute.

Notwithstanding any of the above, NCCPA reserves the right to suspend the eligibility of any PA if the security of an NCCPA exam is in question.
